

But great stories are sometimes just a click away. Surfing the internet for a story idea can produce a windfall of great topics.



It has been said that a picture paints a thousand words and, to that end, there is a great site full of photos that might help you crash the gate on writer's block. Visit the Stars and Stripes on-line newspaper http://www.estripes.com/webpages.asp?id=32&nl=2. The Stars and Stripes goes back many years and was a standard newspaper for GI's during WWII. Now, the paper has opened their vault of terrific photos and offers a photo-of-the-day online. Here are just a few examples:

- → On May 23rd, the photo was taken in Frankfurt, Germany, on October 10, 1949. "William A. Stephens, chief of the CARE mission, presents the 5,000,000th CARE package delivered in Germany to the Kurt Engler family of Frankfurt. The parcel was a gift from Betty Wright Basche of Minneapolis." Who was Mr. Stephens and what was CARE? The time frame was reasonably close to the end of WWII and Germany was in the rebuilding mode. Maybe CARE was a relief effort.
- → On April 29th, the photo archive provided a 1976 photo of Wolfman Jack, a 70's icon for teenagers all over the U.S. The Wolfman was heard daily on about 2,200 radio stations in 40 countries and was in Japan to tape talk shows and commercials for an electronics firm. The Wolfman was a wacky guy for those among us who watched late night television but radio and television has always been filled with wacky people and many could become fun subjects for our speeches.
- ★ Another fun photo is of a family pet. In August 1955, Mrs. Olga Ruhlow, wife of Sgt. Wilbur Ruhlow, called Stars and Stripes to say that she thought the family dog a 5½-year-old boxer named Bruno bore a striking resemblance to a tough first sergeant when dressed in Army togs, and would make a good subject for a photo. Advanced Club Forming in Omaha

Are you interested in joining a new Advanced Toastmasters Club in Omaha?

An advanced Toastmasters Club in Omaha is forming and looking for members who want to turn up their skills. To become a member, you must have your CTM or Competent Communicator designation, and you must be member of at least one other Toastmaster Club.

The members plan to meet on the 1st Monday of each month from 6 - 8 p.m. at Denny's Restaurant - 84th & I-80 (near Grover) - east side of road, south of Mangelsens.

In order to form a new club, Toastmasters requires 20 members. There will be some fees involved:

- \$1.50 per member/per meeting fee for room rental (whether you eat or not)
 - * Dinner meeting Members are encouraged to arrive early to order their food before the meeting starts
- Club membership fees of \$27 per member.
- New club charter fee of \$125 will be split between the members. With 20 members the one time cost would be \$6.25 per member.

Why join? Speakers will be given an opportunity to work on longer assignments in advanced manuals. Additionally, this will be an opportunity to polish your skills in another environment. You'll be able to network with other members, and you'll be working with an experienced group of Toastmasters in addition to your primary club.

The meeting format will differ slightly. There will be no table topics, more speakers, and both an oral and round-robin style of evaluation.

Toastmasters Club #2393, the Offutt Club, was established 1 May, 1957. To celebrate its Golden Anniversary, the club members held a luncheon on May 10th at the base's Patriot Club (formerly Officer's Club). The event was filled with club history, many great speeches, and much more.

During the meeting, former member, Randy Prier, recalled the story of how it became the J.C. Brockway club in honor of a Toastmaster and club member who perished while attempting to land on the base runway in the 1970s, and then eventually reverted back to name "the Offutt Club."

The theme of the luncheon was how public speaking and leadership skills can benefit everyone, and local Toastmaster leaders, Jennie Kannedy (right), Pat Hannan and Sheila Hoffert, each spoke to that message. Frank Wilson, a 25-year Toastmasters veteran and club Vice President of Education, gave a personal testimony of how his time with Toastmasters has given him self-confidence in many aspects of his life.
